Police Department Personnel Changes

At the start of 2018, the Wyoming Police Department was one officer short on staffing levels. Throughout the course of the year, two new officers would be hired and one officer would leave the Wyoming Police Department. Officer Trent Strandberg, badge number 215, gave 13 years of dedicated service to the Wyoming Police Department before accepting a new position with another agency in April. In addition, the Wyoming Police Department created a new non-sworn position, part-time Crime Analyst, which was filled in March.


New Employees in 2018

Swearing In Ceremony





Staffing Levels



Staffing levels frequently raise questions as to whether the department is over or understaffed. The attached charts demonstrate our current staffing levels as compared to similar sized communities around Minnesota and also our neighboring departments. Fully staffed, we are operating with about 33% less sworn officers than communities of similar size.

Note: For the first 8 months of 2018 our Department was operating at 1 officer short.






Patrol Division

Patrol Overview




The Patrol Division is the backbone of our department. It is headed by Sergeant Brian Rod and Sergeant Lance Beardsley. Sergeant Rod has been with our department for 18 years and Sergeant Beardsley for 19 years. The patrol division provides services for the community 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. They handle most calls for service whether for the initial report or to handle it in entirety. While some officers have areas that they specialize in, such as use of force or firearm instruction, all of our patrol officers are trained and equipped to handle the wide variety of situations they encounter. This includes in-progress and not in-progress crimes, medicals, crisis calls, traffic enforcement, motor vehicle accidents, disputes and community assistance calls. Every year brings its own set of challenges, but our officers will continue to put this community first and focus on maintaining safety for all.


2018 Part I and Part II Arrests



Calls for Service



Our total calls for police services were down 25% in 2018 for a total of 12,449 calls. As the Service by Type chart shows, there were over 9,000 calls that were either officer initiated or calls for service that are not Part I, Part II or traffic related activity.

In addition, a significant part of an officer’s shift is devoted to proactive interventions or community assistance that doesn’t rise to the level of a crime. These include regular area, park, and business checks.


During 2018 our department experienced some personnel changes and we were managing at 1 officer short of normal staffing levels for approximately 8 months. As you can see by the graph below, our call numbers from 2018 closely reflect the numbers from 2014, which was before our department added an additional patrol officer.







Patrol Division

Traffic Enforcement



Traffic enforcement is an important element in providing Public Safety services. Our goal is to influence the behaviors of those driving in our community to ensure safe roadways. Officers have the discretion to determine the best disposition to effectively influence those driver's behaviors when conducting traffic stops. The three options are: verbal warnings, administrative citations or a uniform traffic citation. Routine traffic stops often lead to additional criminal behavior discoveries with additional consequences, which may include arrest.

SWAT Team



In 2018 the Wyoming Police Department had two Officers that were assigned to the Chisago County Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT) Team. The Chisago County SWAT Team is a multi-jurisdictional team made up of Law Enforcement personnel from the Chisago County Sheriff's Office, Wyoming Police Department, North Branch Police Department and the Lakes Area Police Department.

The SWAT Team is deployed when a situation dictates the need of specialized equipment and tactically trained officers and is available 24-7. The SWAT team in total consists of 24 Law Enforcement members, tactical medics from Lakes Region EMS and a Crisis Negotiation Team. They train all year on a consistent basis to be prepared for critical incidents.



Investigation Division

Investigations Overview



The Wyoming Police Department's Investigations Unit supports the Patrol Division by providing investigative assistance and by conducting major case investigations. The unit is tasked with continuing an investigation on cases which involve on-going evidence collection, interviews, search warrants, subpoenas, records collection, etc. Traditionally these are more complex cases, which require additional personnel time and extensive follow-up to solve.

There is currently one sworn officer assigned to the Investigations Unit in a full time capacity. This position was held by Officer Matt Paavola in the beginning of 2018 with a switch to Officer Scott Thomas in the first half of the year. Officer Paavola proudly held the position for 5 years before returning to the patrol division. The department transitions sworn officers from Investigations to Patrol, to produce officers that have a more advanced skill set in the field and in the investigation process. Periodically, additional Officers will be assigned to assist with cases which require additional personnel time or for caseloads with high priority. The unit is also assisted by the Wyoming Police Department's Crime Analyst. Investigative matters are overseen by a Police Sergeant who is assigned to the unit. In 2018 the Investigations unit handled cases involving residential and commercial burglaries, theft, criminal sexual conduct, assault, financial fraud, grand larceny, property damage, vandalism, mail tampering, drug related matters, medical fraud, indecent exposure, possessing / disseminating child pornography, identity theft, and more.

Additionally, the Wyoming Police Department's Investigations unit employs one of the 197 active Drug Recognition Experts (DRE) in the State of Minnesota. A DRE is a valuable asset that can offer a further and more complex investigation into matters that involve persons under the influence of a controlled substance or hazardous substance. These cases may involve a motor vehicle crash with injuries, DUI, or any other crime where drug impairment plays a significant role in the case.






Investigation Division

Case Load

The Investigations unit uses a wide variety of tools to solve crimes and to bring those responsible for those crimes to justice. Investigators use sophisticated databases which may allow suspects to be filtered by a multitude of different parameters, view pawn histories, criminal history, court records, etc. The unit has the ability to deploy mobile camera systems which can provide live streams to officers or directly to the Police Department, motion cameras, mobile alarm systems, decoy vehicles, and more. The investigations unit uses a wide variety of evidence collection equipment and technology which includes DNA collection and testing, finger printing, UV light and cyanoacrylate print recovery technologies, fluid collections, and more.



There were 79 cases assigned to investigations in 2018. The attached chart shows the percentage of cases assigned by type of crime as well as another chart showing the clearance of those cases by crime type. Out of those 79 cases assigned to our investigator, all but 3 were closed.

Inclusive Community Initiative

Growth Through Opportunity (GTO) Program

Inclusive community was our top initiative in 2018, with the goal of becoming a Police Department for everyone. Wyoming is made up of diverse and unique individuals, and we believe that only after coming together do we become a community. We are known for our approachable personalities and willingness to work side by side with our residents. One piece that was missing prior to 2018 was our ability to offer the same volunteer opportunities to individuals with disabilities.

In 2018, we decided to partner with the Sieleni family and the creator of the GTO program to become the first agency outside the State of Virginia to implement a similar program to partner law enforcement with individuals with disabilities. Our goal was to create a volunteer opportunity to serve our initiative of inclusive community.

In June of 2018, the Wyoming Police Department piloted the GTO Cadet Program for the state of Minnesota. This one-of-a-kind program was launched in November 2014 by the Roanoke City Police Department, in Roanoke Virginia. It was designed for young adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities. The foundation of the original program is to give cadets the opportunity to work alongside law enforcement personnel to help them gain valuable social and career experience in a professional setting, and we launched our own version of the program following this idea.

18 year old Sean Sieleni, a 2018 graduate from White Bear Lake High School, took on the role of Wyoming's first GTO Cadet. Cadet Sieleni had three goals: 1) get a job that paid, 2) go to college, 3) live independent from his family with a group of peers. Our program helped Cadet Sieleni accomplish all three of his goals, by teaching him how to prepare for employment, work as part of a team, be a productive employee and most importantly it helped him realize his value in a community. The organizational pride, commitment and dedication Cadet Sieleni showed was inspiring to everyone who met him. We are proud of the participation of our local businesses who participated in the program by opening their doors to allow our cadet to try new jobs.

Inclusive Community Initiative

Growth Through Opportunity (GTO) Program



Cadet Sieleni wasn't the only one to benefit from the program. The unique program enabled our employees to work side by side with an individual with disabilities, learning from them the signs and signals projected when encountering frustration, fear and anxiety. Our employees learned to encourage, lead and teach; all valuable skills that translate to daily police work.

We also learned that implicit biases can be overcome through personal experiences that redefine the subconscious stereotypes. For 16 weeks Cadet Sieleni volunteered 30 hours a week at the Police Department, learning normal tasks our officers, firefighters and office staff perform everyday.

After completing the GTO program, Cadet Sieleni had the confidence and self initiative to apply for a job at a grocery market in which he was hired, he was accepted to the Build Program at Bethel College and has since moved in to the dorms with 3 other peers. He is living the normalized dream of going to college, living with roommates and learning to make his own money. Most impressively, Cadet Sieleni has become a state and national spokesperson and inspiration for persons with disabilities as a result of his participation in the Wyoming GTO Program.

The Wyoming Police Department received the 2018 "Excellence in Innovation" Award (pictured below) from the Minnesota Chief's Of Police Association for bringing the GTO Program to the State of Minnesota. Since the graduation of our first Cadet, other police agencies around Minnesota have launched their version of the GTO program in addition to other agencies around the Country. Our GTO Program, and the visibility of its success, has become a staple for inclusive community initiatives for police agencies nationally.






Volunteer Services

Police Reserve Unit



The Police Department relies on a group of 9 community volunteers that make up our Police Reserve Unit. They are individuals from all walks of life, including those interested in pursuing a law enforcement career and those who simply want to volunteer. They are unpaid and volunteer in their spare time to help with community events, do ride along's with officers, patrol the community as an additional presence and help officers on a number of community services calls. In 2018, these dedicated individuals volunteered 1,367.5 hours of their personal time to assist our department. The chart below represents how the hours were allocated.

Crime Prevention

Residence Checks

The Wyoming Police Department offers residence checks, or “Vacation Check” services to all Wyoming residents. This is a free and voluntary service provided by the Wyoming Police Department and its reserve officers. When an individual is going out of town, they can worry less about trespassers, vandalism, break-in’s, or other criminal activity occurring on their property. Officers and reserves on patrol will regularly check the homes of those that request residence checks and notify them or their designated emergency contact/key holder if something doesn’t seem normal.

The Minnesota Crime Alert Network

The Minnesota Crime Alert Network is a statewide communications network that enables law enforcement agencies to quickly alert the public about a crime or criminals. Nearly 10,000 Minnesota law enforcement agencies, businesses, schools and community members participate in the network.



Wyoming Officers also practice crime prevention daily by self initiating area, business, and residence checks throughout the city. This all ties into our goal of keeping Wyoming a safe place to live and visit for all.

Community Events and Educational Programs

National Night Out



National Night Out is an annual community-building event that promotes positive police-community partnerships and neighborhood camaraderie to make our neighborhoods safer, more community-oriented places to live. It is our largest event we hold each year. Other agencies state wide participate in similar community events on this day, the first Tuesday of August. National Night Out enhances the relationship between residents and law enforcement while fostering a true sense of community. Furthermore, it brings first responders and civilians together under positive circumstances. Our department enjoys hosting our National Night Out event each year at Goodview Park, where the community is able to come and enjoy a night with members of Wyoming Public Safety while also enjoying many free activities including a petting zoo, a giant jumper, a photo booth, police and fire demonstrations along with food and beverages, and much more.

Police Educating Area Kids (P.E.A.K.)

The Police Educating Area Kids (P.E.A.K) Program is a drug education program that is unique to the City of Wyoming. This program is a collaborative project between the Wyoming Police Department and Wyoming Elementary School, designed to educate kids on the drug trends observed in our community. Each school year, a Wyoming Officer spends 10 weeks with the 5th grade students learning what drugs are, how they can negatively affect your life, and how to deal with future situations that our kids will encounter. The program allows our officers to spend time in the elementary school and build positive connections with the youth in our community.



Firearms Safety Course

Officers from the Wyoming Police Department held a Youth Firearms/Hunter's Safety course in the fall. The 16 hour course was taught by our three firearm instructors. This course was made available to firearm beginners for free through the [Minnesota Department of Natural Resources \(DNR\)](#). We offer this course every fall to individuals 12 and over who are interested in learning more about firearm safety and obtaining their hunting license.

Touch-A-Truck

A family-friendly annual event for people of all ages. Event goers got the chance to get up close and personal with police cars, fire trucks, public works heavy machinery and other specialty vehicles. This event is always a hit with young kids each summer.



Stagecoach Days

This event is named after the city's history. Wyoming was the first stop on the stagecoach route from St. Paul to Duluth in the late 1800's. Each September the Wyoming Fire Relief Association puts on this family-friendly event that features a parade, activities, food and beverage vendors, and a fire-work show.



Pancake Breakfast

In July, Meadows on Fairview, a local senior living community, put on a pancake breakfast that was hosted by the Wyoming Police Department.



Officers and office staff served breakfast, with the proceeds going back to the police department to be used for other community events, such as National Night Out. This year \$253 was raised thanks to all that attended.



Law Enforcement Torch Run (LETR)

Each June the Wyoming Police Department, along with other law enforcement agencies in Chisago County and across Minnesota, take part in this event to raise awareness and funds for the Special Olympics movement. Public Safety staff and community members put on their running shoes and carried the torch, with GTO Cadet Sean Sieleni having the honor of carrying it in the last leg before it was passed on to Forest Lake.

Bus Stop Thursdays

During the school year, officers stop at various bus stops to interact with the kids and hand out donated stuffed animals. The perfect way to keep kids safe while sticking to community oriented policing.

During the holiday season, we challenged our community to a fun winter contest through our Facebook page. We take great pride in engaging the community we serve in fun activities that bring people together.






Technology

Technology has become a major behind the scenes component of modern day policing. The Records Management System (RMS) is the backbone to how we access information at the office, in the squad cars and receive driver/vehicle data from the State. The RMS is a highly robust database that tracks every person and vehicle that our officers have contact with.

Any evidence that officers collect or photograph is also entered and tracked through the RMS to ensure an accurate chain of custody to protect the integrity of the evidence, for the trial process and final disposition.



Our technology extends from the office to the patrol vehicles. All of our patrol vehicles are equipped with the same access to information that you find in the office. This improves the officers informed decision making process in the field, keeping our officers out in the public therefore reducing the time needed in the office to complete reports. 95% of all data entry can be done remotely from the squad. This results in quicker response times to emergency calls and increased officer visibility in your neighborhood. In 2018 we extended that mobility into our fire vehicles, as fire first responders now have access to live call data and enroute mapping in their vehicles to improve pre-arrival operational planning.

Wyoming Public Safety's most visible use of technology is through our social media presence. We utilize social media platforms for a variety of purposes, to communicate emergency situations to the public, disseminate public safety announcements, request crime tips from the public, offer a virtual ride-along experience and showcase the positive interactions in the community. Our Twitter account, @wyomingpd, is one of the most followed Police Department accounts in Minnesota with over 60,000 followers, and we are nationally recognized for our unique and effective programming.


Training



A training program is an essential part to the success of our department. We must maintain and strive to improve on the necessary motor skills for performing our duties in the event of a critical incident, so that our employees are confident, proficient and highly effective in the field. A critical incident is not the place to practice performance. We are also required to meet state mandates and stay current with the frequently changing laws established by our legislators. During 2018 we logged over 450 hours training our police officers.

Prepared readiness not only includes training our employees but also conducting regular exercises with our major community partners that have been identified as high potentials for critical incidents, such as the local hospital. This is to ensure they are also ready to perform and integrate into our emergency management plan during these events.


In 2018, we spent \$10,999 on police training courses, to include off-site courses, webinars, conferences, in-house refreshers and supplies for our firearm range training. Our total cost for training employees was \$29,426 for the Police Department. The on average per-employee cost for training was \$2,942 for continued education fees and wages.

Annual Public Safety Budgets




Unlike other departments in the city, a majority of the operating costs of running the Wyoming Public Safety Department is funded from tax levy dollars. Like most industries we are faced with the same inflating costs of healthcare, insurances, labor contracts, COLA increases, State and Federal unfunded mandates and increases in vendor supplies and services costs.

Each budget cycle we examine operations from a performance expectation model to determine the return on our investment, and reallocate funds to effective functions and discontinue those that are underperforming.


The Public Safety model of management includes Emergency Management, fire and police operations. Managing the different principles under a unified umbrella of “Public Safety” allows us to manage funding more efficiently by reducing the duplication of service functions. The model also supports the multi-purposing of shared equipment and staff to keep the costs of operation lower.

In 2018, fire services accounted for 23% of the total Public Safety budget, while police services accounted for 77% of the \$1,721,732 total annual operating budget for Public Safety.

Personnel cost contributes the largest portion of our operating budget. These costs include regular wages, over-time, court costs, FICA, workers compensation insurance, healthcare costs and retirement contributions. Wyoming Public Safety has over 50 dedicated employees between fire and police operations, 11 full-time, and the remainder either part-time or paid-on-call responders. Our dedicated employees are responsible for covering the city 24 hours a day, 7 days a week for all 365 calendar days. Personnel costs also include the training wages and emergency response wages for our paid-on-call fire fighters.



The city receives reimbursement, grants and State Aid to off-set some of the costs of providing public safety services. POST reimbursements are funded by the Minnesota Police Officer Standards and Training Board to support officer training expenses.


In 2018 the State of Minnesota increased the per-officer training reimbursement to help off-set the cost of State Mandated Crisis Intervention Training for all officers.



We are always looking for other funding opportunities to off-set operational expenses. In 2018, we received \$13,189 in subsidized grants, and these are often reimbursement grants for special projects such as our Towards Zero Deaths (TZD) traffic enforcement programs, fire training or equipment.

Police and fire State Aid helps subsidize pension costs for local governments. State Aid amounts are determined by the state and distributed in October each year to local governments.

Special Revenue is generated as a result of providing services. These funds are used to off-set the cost of special projects, capital equipment and community functions. They are also used to contract with the Lakes Center for Youth and Family Services for youth programs, our National Night Out event, and to replace some of our police vehicles and equipment.



Lastly, we also generate revenue from auctioning items to the public. Auction proceeds represent the disposal of unclaimed vehicles and property from our impound lot and evidence room. In 2018 alone we received \$16,034.73 from the sale of these items.






This information is used in developing our patrol and staffing schedule. Our resources are adjusted to address peak times and demand, to ensure adequate staffing.






Part I and Part II Crimes

A DESCRIPTION OF UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING OFFENSES AND THEIR CLASSIFICATION

The Department of Public Safety Bureau of Criminal Apprehension (BCA) uses reporting techniques recommended by the FBI to record data submitted by Minnesota law enforcement agencies. The submitted data contains information regarding Part I Offenses. Part I Offenses consist of ten serious crimes that occur on a regular basis and are likely to be reported to law enforcement. Part I Offenses are generally referred to as the “Crime Index” measurement. Part II Offenses represent “less serious” crime classifications. Part I and Part II crimes are defined by the FBI Uniform Crime Reporting Program. Part I Offenses include murder, rape, aggravated assault, robbery, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft, arson, human trafficking – commercial sex acts, and human trafficking – and involuntary servitude. These crimes were chosen by the FBI because of their uniformity of definition, total volumes, and likelihood of being reported. Murder, rape, aggravated assault, human trafficking, and robbery are also known as “violent crimes.” Burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft and arson are considered “property crimes.” A law enforcement agency becomes aware of these crimes in several ways: reports by its officers, citizen complaints, notification from a prosecuting attorney or information supplied by court officials.




The charts above show a decrease in Wyoming’s total number of both Part I and Part II crimes in 2018 compared to previous years, showing that our crime rate has decreased.






Crime Index

These are the number of index offenses reported for each unit of population, per 100,000 persons. Crime rates are computed for communities with varying populations by dividing the number of index crimes by the population and multiplying the result by 100,000. This is the national standard for computing the Crime Index per community, establishing a consistent value of reporting regardless of community size or population.



As shown in the charts provided the Crime Rate in Wyoming has decreased in 2018 from previous years. They also show that the crime rate in Wyoming is lower than surrounding cities of similar size.





Welcome to the Wyoming Fire Department’s portion of the Annual Report.

During 2018 the Wyoming Fire Department employed 30 paid on call firefighters under the guidance and leadership of Chief JJ Hastings. What makes this group of men and women so strong as a unit is our diversity. We own businesses and raise children at home. We are military reservists, laborers, and managers. The single most common thing amongst all of our firefighters is our dedication to community and our Fire Department. Our personnel are truly top notch.

In 2018, the Wyoming Fire Department responded to 310 calls for service, which ranged from structure fires, to motor vehicle accidents to medical calls. We are an All Hazards Response department, meaning we respond to all types of hazards in the City of Wyoming. We are also a Chisago County Mutual Aid Agency and we have mutual aid agreements with Washington County and Anoka county.

The following charts illustrate the difference in call volume according to call type: EMS or medical calls, Fire calls, Rescue calls such as motor vehicle accidents, and Service calls to include services not covered by the other three categories. Nearly 60% of calls were EMS related calls, with Fire and Rescue calls falling in at about 20% and Service calls at less than 1%.

Leadership Bios

Chief JJ Hastings joined the Wyoming Fire Department within weeks of his 18th birthday in November of 2000. A few years later JJ would take a leave from Wyoming and pursue aviation in Anchorage, Alaska. After completing his bachelor's degree he returned home to Wyoming. After a few years as WFD's training officer, JJ was promoted to Captain in 2006. In 2018 JJ decided that it was time for him to step down as the Fire Chief for Wyoming at the end of the year. He is currently a Commercial Pilot and enjoys spending as much time at home with his wife and kids as possible.



Assistant Chief John Hastings Sr. joined the Wyoming Fire Department in June of 1988. He is in charge of all facilities, equipment and apparatus. Prior to serving as an Assistant Chief, John served as the Department Training Officer from 1995 to 2003 and Captain from 2003 to 2009. When Chief John isn't running a local business or taking care of Fire Department duties he enjoys snowmobiling, riding his motorcycle and spending time at the lake.



Deputy Chief Joe Kuskey was promoted to Deputy Chief as part of a succession plan in Spring of 2013 when former Chief Dan announced he would be retiring. During that time Joe has been in charge of training and then transitioned to be in charge of our hiring. Joe joined the department in December of 2008 after having more than 5 years of prior experience with the Maplewood Fire Department. Joe was promoted to the position of Captain in fall of 2011. Joe has spent countless hours learning and refining his craft and is a passionate voice for the fire service.



Deputy Chief Jesse Milligan has been with us since August of 2011. Jesse was assigned as a Training Officer in January 2013. In June of 2013 Jesse was promoted to the position of Captain when Joe Kuskey was promoted to Deputy Chief. Jesse was managing the fire department's hiring, recruitment and retention. In 2015 as part of the Department succession planning Jesse was promoted to Deputy Chief. His roles during this time were being in charge of hiring and retention before switching roles with Joe Kuskey to be in charge of training. At the end of 2018 it was announced that Jesse would succeed Chief JJ Hastings and become the Fire Chief in 2019.

Training and Recruitment

Types of Training

The trainings the Wyoming Fire Department attends on an annual basis is quite varied. We train twice a month on Fire/Rescue subjects and once a month on Emergency Medical Services. The rest of our training time is split up between unscheduled trainings and classes for development of all Wyoming Firefighters, from the newest recruit to the most senior officers. We are very fortunate to have the Stacy-Lent Burn Tower just up the road from us and this affords us the opportunity to train with live fire in a controlled environment. Personal and professional development never ends in this business. There is an old adage that holds quite true, “The day you stop learning is the day you are done.”

2018 Officers Class

In 2018 we continued our succession planning and officer development plan. We were able to send our employees to different officer development classes that were offered through Century College. These classes qualify for reimbursement through the MBFTE which allows us to recoup some of the money spent on training.



Recruitment and Retention

In 2018 we were fortunate to take on 9 new firefighters to add to our ranks. Zach Bergman, Anthony Hyrkas, Josh Bergan, Justin Gervais, Dezera Sieracki, Adam Sauerwein, Justin Chapa, Sean O’Connell and Jake Gruber all joined the ranks of Wyoming Fire. We look forward to seeing where their careers will go. As with any organization there will be turnover, and we had to say goodbye to 3 firefighters in 2018 as well.

As of 2019, we are currently accepting applications from people in the community who are highly motivated to make Wyoming a better place through the Fire Department. Become a part of our team.



Training Budget

During 2018 we logged 2,031 hours training our firefighters. We spent \$11,639 on fire training courses to include off-site courses, webinars, conferences and in-house refreshers. Our total cost for training employees was \$45,930 for the Fire Department and the on average cost per-employee for training was \$1,531 for continued education fees and wages.

The Wyoming Fire Department Mentor Program

The Wyoming Fire Department started a Mentor Program in 2006 for the purpose of educating new firefighters on department standards and policies. The Mentor Program has flourished and grown into a very beneficial system to develop firefighters at a much faster rate that would have taken years prior to its implementation. For 2018 the Mentor Program was managed and lead by our training group which consists of Deputy Chief Joe Kuskey, Capt. Tony Sarff and training officers Hunter Huberty, Chris Kubal and Trevor Schnieder.

Apparatus and Equipment

The Wyoming Fire Department operates a fleet of 4 apparatus (fire trucks) and 5 support vehicles.

Our 4 apparatus includes a 2005 Rosenbauer built engine (Engine 1) that has seating for 6, a pump that can move 1,500 gallons of water/minute and 1,000 gallons of water in a booster tank. Engine 1 is our first due engine to all fire and rescue responses. We also have a 2010 Rosenbauer built engine/tanker (Engine 3) that is similarly set up to Engine 1. Engine 3 has all of the same capabilities as Engine 1 but carries a total of 2,500 gallons of water and is utilized as a “Heavy Rescue” for vehicle accidents. Engine 3 has a set of hydraulic extrication tools along with vehicle stabilization equipment. Our ladder truck (Ladder 1) is a 2000 General Safety built truck on an International Chassis and can reach a total of 75 feet with a nozzle at the end of the ladder, capable of delivering in excess of 500 gallons of water/minute. Our oldest engine (Engine 2) was built by General in 1996 and can also carry 2,500 gallons. Engine 2 is currently slated for replacement in 2019 with a new engine of similar design. These 4 vehicles allow us to respond to any structure fire in our response area with more than 6,000 gallons of water in less than 10 minutes.

Our fleet of support vehicles includes a 2014 Ford F-450 currently in use as a rescue truck. Rescue 1 is our first response vehicle for all Medical emergencies. Rescue 1 is also currently outfitted with all of our cold water rescue equipment and some of our vehicle stabilization equipment. We also have a 2001 F350 pickup outfitted for wildland fires as our Grass rig and 2012 and 2014 Ford Explorers used as a Command Vehicles.

Our vehicles are managed and maintained by Captain 3, Travis Parson, with the assistance of the other Engineers.

Community Involvement

Every year the Wyoming Fire Department is heavily involved in community outreach and 2018 was no different. While our department takes pride in committing to community-oriented fire service on a regular basis, we also take part in numerous planned community events.

Tours – We have every kind of group in Wyoming come through the firehouse for a tour on a yearly basis. Boy scouts, girl scouts, daycares and church groups all toured the firehouse in 2018.

Fire Prevention – In 2018 Wyoming Fire had another successful fire prevention presentation at Wyoming Elementary. Over the past few years we have developed a grade level specific curriculum that has allowed us to make more of an impact with each grade level. This culminates with the 6th graders who each get to handle a fire extinguisher and use the prop.



Fire Department Open House – Every October the Firehouse opens its doors to the public for an open house event for one evening.

The Wyoming Fire Department also takes part in National Night Out each summer with the Wyoming Police Department, and heads the city's Stagecoach Day's event each fall.


