 Re: Wyoming MS4 Program and SWPPP

What Is an MS4 and Why Does It Matter to You?

An MS4, or Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System, is a network of public infrastructure, like streets, gutters, catch basins, and ditches, designed to collect and carry stormwater runoff. Unlike sanitary sewers, MS4s don't treat water before it flows into lakes, rivers, and wetlands. As an MS4 community, Wyoming is responsible for reducing pollutants that enter our stormwater system. To do this, the City follows a Stormwater Pollution Prevention Program (SWPPP), which outlines strategies for protecting water quality. Each SWPPP includes six minimum control measures (MCM) that address the following areas:

					
1. Public Education and Outreach	2. Public Participation and Involvement	3. Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination	4. Construction Site Stormwater Runoff Control	5. Post-Construction Site Management	6. Good Housekeeping and Pollution Prevention
